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Bethlehem Food Co-Op—What is a co-op?

Tuesday, October 21 at 7 pm at Palmer Library

Speaker: Jon Soden, Treasurer Bethlehem Food Co-Op

Our speaker, Jo Soden, servers as treasurer on the board of the Bethlehem Food Co-Op. He will be talking with us about this start up which is hoping to open in the summer of 2015.

Here are a few facts from their website in answer to 'What is a co- op?'. "The co-op will appear much like a standard supermarket (although hopefully with a bit more atmosphere) and will operate year-round out of the same storefront. Like a CSA (community supported agricultura), members will make a financial investment, but it will be a one-time equity payment (as opposed to yearly), and the return on that investment will come through perks in the store as well as cash patronage dividends on years the co-op makes a profit. Like a farmers' market, the co-op will offer a collection of the best products from local growers. Basically, we've taken the best from each of these sorts of businesses and merged them into something fantastic!"

Come learn about the co-op and the opportunity to buy all your groceries locally at a store that emphasizes local, sustainable, humane, and natural food. The Bethlehem Food CO-OP is in the process of growing its owner-membership base.

From the Presidents' Pens:

Get Out the Vote

Women traveled a long road to gain the right to vote. It took Elizabeth Cady Stanton with her connections and frustrations to start the ball rolling on July 19, 1848 in the Wesleyan Chapel in Seneca Falls, NY. That act led to the Declaration of Sentiments which was signed by 100 people, both women and men, with many of them agreeing that it was on the radical side. What followed was years of lobbying and demonstrations, passing out pamphlet after pamphlet, publishing editorials, and giving speeches to make it happen. We now celebrate August 26 as Women's Equality Day which is the anniversary of the passage of the 19th Amendment giving women the right to vote.

But women are still traveling a long road. Some states are trying to or have passed legislation that requires voters to have ID cards which targets low income people, minorities and the elderly, all of which directly affects women. Women are still waiting for the passage of the Paycheck Fairness Act. When the Supreme Court sided with two for profit companies

that challenged the Affordable Care Act's contraceptive coverage requirement, women were singled out for discrimination. Saying that a woman can pay for a longacting reversible contraceptive is again placing low income women at risk of an unwanted pregnancy when the cost of this type of birth control can be as high as \$1000.00.

The people elected to office are decided by us, the voters. This fall AAUW has been sponsoring GOTV sites at community colleges, colleges and neighborhood centers where AAUW members register new voters. No politics allowed . . . just sign the form so you can vote in the coming elections. Many voters skip the mid-term elections, but every vote counts and can make a difference in passing laws that include equality for all women. So remember to stay involved, study the ballot measures and vote.

I am pleased to announce that our Easton Branch has received a \$100 Public Policy Impact Mini-Grant award from AAUW-PA to support our public-policy programs planned for this year. Through an issues forum featuring the documentary, "A Place at the Table," we intend to educate the community about hunger in America and its relationship to economic insufficiency. Completing the form after each event also will make completion of the mid-year report, due to us by January 12, 2015 an easy task.

• Remember that you will want to keep track of numbers as you go along—i.e. How many members of the branch were involved in planning? How many Coalition partners? How many events? How many community attendees?---so that you can point to "measurable achievements" in your reports.

Your branch finance officer will receive shortly from the AAUW-PA Finance Officer, Susan Donahue, a check for \$100.00. Be sure that receipts for all expenditures are collected and included as part of the mid-year and/or final Mini-Grant reports. If you have any questions related to this, please let us know.

Membership Meeting

Opening the 2014 – 15 year of AAUW activities, sixteen members had a potluck at the Presbyterian Church in downtown Easton Tuesday evening. The food was delicious as usual and the conversations lively and hard to interrupt for business matters.

The highlight of the evening, while we enjoyed our meal, was Linda and Bonnie Scott who demonstrated the clothing from the Civil War era. Linda dressed

Bonnie from cotton long underwear to corset to corset cover to hoops. The hoop undergarment was then covered with two separate "Petticoats" for modesty and topped off with a skirt. The blouse/jacket matched the skirt, having only two colors, which is all a "schoolmarm" could afford in cloth. The simple collar and brooch were attached as well as a pocket watch on the outer apron (also of two colors). Her netted hair was then covered by a straw hat trimmed in lace at the brow and she carried a black parasol to top off the outfit.

I had no idea how difficult life was at that time for women. Bonnie's sister Linda attended in dressing the schoolmarm, as one cannot bend over in such an outfit. The tight corset also caused health problems for women then as it forced one's inner organs out of alignment, to say nothing of constricting breathing. That is why so many women fainted in those days . . . lack of oxygen!

Bonnie explained that young children wore dresses till age four. A part in the center indicated a female child while boys' hair was parted to the side. There were rules for mourning which progressed slowly for women to half-mourning after a year and one day when they were then able to take the veil off their face and put it on the back of their head. The upper class had different dress codes from the middle and lower classes and proper men wore white shirts with a waistcoat and never left home without a cravat or neck apparel of some sort.

Learning all this creates a desire to learn more about the dress of that era and all the nuances involved. You may visit the Quiet Valley Living Historical Farm to see these two ladies dressed in authentic vintage raiment from life in the 1800's on a small Pennsylvania farm.
