From the Presidents' Pens:

The Keystoner, Sept. 2015, that AAUW-PA
has again been awarded a Public Policy
Impact Grant for the coming year. The priorities
chosen are: Pay Equity and Get Out the Vote.

This past July, the United States Women's National Soccer Team earned \$2 million for winning its first **FIFA World Cup** since 1999 . . . while the German men's championship team earned \$35 million in 2014.

According to the White House—full time working women earn 77% of what their male counterparts earn. This means that women have to work approximately 60 extra days, or 3 months to earn what men did by the end of the previous year.

The gender gap does not only effect individuals—entire families are impacted by women's earnings. When women's wages are lowered due to gender discrimination, their families' incomes are often significantly lowered as well.

Women are more likely to work in low-wage, "pink-collar" jobs such as teaching, child care, nursing, cleaning and waitressing. The top ten jobs held by women include: secretaries and administrative assistants (#1); elementary and middle-school teachers (#4); retail salespeople (#6); and maids and housekeepers (#10). These jobs typically pay less than male dominated jobs.

While more education is an effective tool for increasing earnings, it is not an effective tool against the gender pay gap.

The pay gap grows by age.

According to a recent regression analysis of federal data by IWPR (Institute for Women's Policy Research), the poverty rate for working women would be cut in half if women were paid the same as men in comparable jobs.
