Did you know.....

- •The number of women incarcerated has grown by more than 800% over the last three decades and outpaced men by more than 50%.
- •A staggering number of women incarcerated are not convicted. Sixty percent of women in jails are awaiting trial.
- •80% of women in jails are mothers and most are primary caretakers. Many enter with a history of emotional, physical and sexual abuse.
- Upon release they are often discriminated against and face restrictions in housing, employment, and education. They face steep fees along with child care and transportation issues.

We have an opportunity to focus on women and incarceration and learn more about the many barriers that women face. On October 26th we will hear from two local experts, Bonnie Winfield, Ph.D., director of The Journey Home program for women, and Lori VanDoren LSW, MSW, Director of Forensic Services from Pinebrook Family Answers. Along with two returning citizens, they will share the unique experiences that women face. You will have the opportunity to have your questions answered.

Please come to this joint event sponsored by AAUW-Easton Branch, AAUW Bethlehem, and League of Women Voters. It would be great if you would bring winter hats, gloves, and scarves which will be given to the women from Journey Home and Pinebrook Family Answers.

Co-Presidents Nancy Kinzli and Karol D'Huyvetters joined many community and Student Organizations at the Annual Quad Fest of Northampton Community College to welcome students to the new school year. Quad Fest is designed to introduce students to campus clubs and opportunities in the community. Nancy and Karol set up a table with information about AAUW. We had informational pamphlets on Women and Student Debt, Gender Pay Gap and The Status of Women in Leadership for the students. Also, we handed out AAUW magnets, organizational postcards, pamphlets and our branch's new membership brochures.

We generated student interested with information on AAUW's online Work Smart course on salary negotiation. There were many discussions with students about the gender pay gap and learning to negotiate a salary. Several students stated they had researched the gender pay gap for a course and written a research paper on this topic. But very few students indicated any knowledge about skills needed to negotiate salary or benefits. Many students were interested in discussing this and took the information about the Work Smart online course. We also gave the information to counselors to share with their students. One student, Brianna Bancey, signed up as a Student Affiliate. We're hoping to see her at our Branch Meetings and Programs. Overall, we felt that we were able to inform students and professors about AAUW, our mission and causes that we support.

AAUW-PA Public Policy Highlights

This year, AAUW-PA Public Policy Chairs, Barbara Price and Jacqui Rogers, are framing public policy as it relates to the **AAUW Strategic Plan** and the **AAUW Public Policy Priorities**.

Economic Security - To achieve economic security for all women, AAUW advocates:

- Pay equity and fairness in compensation and benefits
- Greater availability of and access to a high standard of benefits and policies that promote work-life balance, including quality and affordable dependent care and paid family, medical, and sick leave
- Increasing the number of quality jobs that pay a living wage



At the federal level, the House passed the Paycheck Fairness Act. Now we need to get it passed in the Senate.

In Pennsylvania, our work to pass **pay equity** legislation continues during this session of the state legislature which ends December 31, 2020. The good news is that we now have a senate bill, **SB721** sponsored by Senators Santarsiero and Collett that is exactly the same as **HB850** sponsored by Representatives Sims and Davis. This is the first time we have had a comparable bill in the senate. Thank your legislators if they are co-sponsors of these bills or if not, ask them to support the bills. Click on each bill to check for co-sponsors.

Another issue we will follow this year is **raising the minimum wage**. The state minimum wage is \$7.25 per hour, lower than all neighboring states. The Keystone Research Center has posted fact sheets estimating the number and characteristics of workers affected by a minimum wage increase to \$15. The factsheets present data specific to <u>Counties</u> and to <u>Senate and state House Districts</u>. These fact sheets refute the usual arguments that only teens at fast food restaurants make minimum wage. The majority of people affected are women and people over the age of 40. Look up your county and your legislator. Great pieces to leave behind when you visit your legislators.

Another way to view the minimum wage issue is to compare it to a living wage. The <u>Living Wage Calculator</u> lets you see the hourly rate that an individual must earn to support his/her family by county. There are no counties in Pennsylvania where the minimum wage provides a living wage. Raising the minimum wage would go a long way toward alleviating the wage gap. AAUW-PA supports the One Fair Wage bills, <u>HB1215</u> and <u>SB12</u>
