### *Quality of Life Issues for Women*

A Zoom Forum

Tuesday, September 29, 2020 - 7pm

Poverty, homelessness, child care, inequality, hunger, domestic violence and oppression are not issues unique to women, but they often disproportionately affect women. If an issue affects a woman, it often affects her children, her parents, and her family. What is our community doing to help with these issues, especially in this time of Covid-19? How can we help?

We are fortunate to learn about these community issues from experts in the field who have been actively helping others in these areas for years. **Janice Thomas**, Director of Homeless Services at Third Street Alliance, and **Janice Komisor**, Executive Director of ProJeCt Easton will be joined by **Senator Lisa Boscola** and /or **her staff** for a lively discussion of these issues.

## From the Presidents' Pens

How well do you know the Suffragists? Take the quiz and see how many you can name (the answers are at the end of the article)

1. In the 1800's, who divorced her husband and advocated for women's rights?
2. While in prison for picketing the White House, who organized a hunger strike?
3. Name the two suffragists who worked together to co-found the Alpha Suffrage Club (the first suffrage organization for African American Women).
4. Who requested the phrase "promise to obey" be removed from her wedding vows because "I obstinately refused to obey one with whom I supposed I was entering into an equal relation."
5. Who succeeded in persuading a local chapter of the American Association of University Women to admit African American Women?

The women above and many more fought hard for women to have the right to vote. The battle began in 1848; women and men gathered in Seneca Falls, N.Y. and wrote the Declarations of Sentiments which founded the women's movement. During the next 70 years, women organized, protested, picketed, wrote articles and some were imprisoned for their actions. On August 26, 1920, women gained the right to vote. Unfortunately, African American and Native American women were denied access to voting. Years later and with ongoing struggles, they were included in the voting process.

Women continued to fight for the recognition as equal members for job opportunities, equal pay and rights. The 1970's brought a period of social unrest and women continued the battle for equal rights.

In 1971, Congress passed a resolution to recognize the sacrifices the suffragists made for gender equality. August 26 is celebrated as Women's Equality Day.

This year is very important – not only are we celebrating the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment but it is also a Presidential Election Year. In celebration of the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment, we are working with the Sigal Museum to introduce you to some of the famous suffragists in Conversations Through Time! The Women Who Won the Vote. Volunteers from the Sigal Museum will present their suffragists in costume and answer questions about their role in the women's movement.

To help us prepare for issues in the upcoming elections, we have planned a panel discussion focusing on Quality of Life Issues for Women to increase our awareness of the problems many women face. Topics covered will include poverty, homelessness, job re-entry, pay equity and child care. We will honor the women who fought for our right to vote by becoming informed voters and participating in this year's election!

## DIVERSITY: DEEDS AND DIALOGUE 'GOES' TO HARRISBURG

On July 15<sup>th</sup>, some members of the Diversity: Deeds and Dialogue study group joined other AAUW-PA members from across the state for the first in the series of Webinar Conversations held in lieu of the Covid 19 canceled 2020 state Convention. Led by AAUW-PA Public Policy Chair, Barbara Price, the conversation featured Pennsylvania's First Lady Francis Wolf.

During the conversation Mrs. Wolf noted her interest in the issue of women and the criminal justice system, particularly that of reentry, and spoke about her commitment to and related experiences in addressing problems. In the Q & A, Randi Blauth, thanked her and the governor for recognizing the need for attention and change. Randi also mentioned our DDD group, its study of and efforts in support of effecting change. At that time, Mrs. Wolf expressed an interest in what we had done and said that she'd be in touch. The very next day her staff assistant got in touch to invite us to a discussion of the issues affecting women reentering their communities after being in jail or prison. We jumped at the chance and the meeting was scheduled.

A week later, Diversity: Deeds and Dialogue study group members--Nancy Kinzli, Susan McNamara, Rosemary Baker, Toni Hoffman, Fran Kennedy, Randi Blauth, - joined by Bonnie Winfield of The Journey Home--"went" to Harrisburg via Zoom. Jen Wilburne, Chief of Staff for the First Lady and Madeline Williams, Executive Assistant to the First Lady, led an hour-long, energized and energizing discussion rich with shared experiences and information. Jen and Madeline gave us a picture of many initiatives already under way stemming from the offices of the First Lady and Governor. The DDD group brought to the discussion insights from their study of the myriad issues, its work with the Pinebrook Family Answers grant-funded project

on women's reentry, connection with Bonnie and The Journey Home and with involvement of some DDD members in the new End Mass Incarceration group in Easton,

Among many topics, we spoke of the barriers to safe housing, jobs, job training, and transportation. We discussed safety, mental health, domestic violence. We focused in on the issues of the expectations for and training of all employees in the criminal justice prison/jail system. Citing the fifteen percent recidivism rate due to breaking parole for issues like lack of transportation and missing an appointment, for example, we stressed the importance of quality probation officers and case managers who understand the obstacles put in front of these women. Also discussed was bail reform: women risk losing their jobs, housing, and custody of children if they are placed in jail, even before trial, for inability to put up cash bail.

We all happily agreed to keep in touch. Mrs. Wolf's staff will keep us informed (updated?) of their progress and we will help where we can.

Muriel graduated in 1947 from Capital University in Columbus, Ohio, with a Bachelor of Science in

Education degree. She taught mathematics for 12 years in Gibsonburg, Ohio.

After moving to Easton, Pennsylvania, she became active in the American Association of University Women, served as president of the Easton Branch from 1978-1980 and received the honor of Outstanding Woman of the Year in 1997-1998. She served on the Women's Board of Easton Hospital for nine years, acting as chair for two years. She also served as treasurer of the Good Shepherd Christian Nursery School.

In 1999, she was inducted into the Capital University Athletic Hall of Fame. She moved to Lancaster in 2014 and became active at Woodcrest Villa, serving on the staff of the Villager newsletter.

She traveled extensively in the United States with her husband and was proud to complete visits to all 50 states. Her favorite pastime was playing competitive bridge, and as a member of the American Contract Bridge League, she was merely points away from becoming a Life Master.

She often quoted her favorite poem by Edgar Guest that begins: "Somebody said that it couldn't be done, but he with a chuckle replied, that maybe it couldn't, but he would be one.
