From the Leadership Team

I think we can all agree that we never expected to have a pandemic occur in our lifetimes. It changed our lives, left us diminished in some ways and yet, going forward, we are encouraged that some positive elements are emerging.

We learned to zoom and now we've learned how to have hybrid meetings and programs so that those members who, for one reason or another are not comfortable meeting in person, will still be able to participate.

We are planning for in-person participation from all branch members in our upcoming events such as the Authors' Luncheon on April 9th, our inaugural Girls Recognition Night on May 5th and our May Scholarship Dessert and Award Ceremony on May 17th. **The question is:** Should we try for a hybrid Authors' Luncheon and will it work? Ditto that for our May Scholarship Dessert and Award Ceremony. Stay tuned. Accommodations for zooming for the Girls' Recognition Night, though, are likely because the Nurture Nature Center should have good internet access and all the props we need to set up a laptop and zoom link.

While we're looking ahead to being and working together for the betterment of women and girls, we do so recognizing that the pandemic has brought into sharp relief the many injustices that affect women and girls around the world, in our country and in Pennsylvania. One such injustice is the minimum wage around the country and certainly in Pennsylvania. For example, Pennsylvania's minimum wage, now \$7.25/hour, has not changed for more than a decade.

This is not a livable wage!

Governor Wolf did raise the minimum wage to \$15 per hour for all Commonwealth employees and recently moved to raise the wages for tipped workers with an update to the 1977 rules that govern how employers pay them. Governor Wolf also included a request in his budget address that the legislature boost Pennsylvania's minimum wage to \$12/hour by July 1, with the eventual goal of raising it to \$15/hour. Time will tell if that request is granted.

Two quotes come to mind - "The minimum wage should be a living wage" said Jon Ossoff, (Senator from Georgia) and from Richard J. Codey (Senator, NJ Legislature) "If a man or a woman puts in an honest day's work, they should be able to earn a living wage."

It's time to vote in legislators who believe in fair pay and a living wage. Use your vote wisely.

FY23 National, State and Local Dues Rates

Meet The Authors



Kate Brandes is a creative writer and artist who's also worked as a geologist and environmental scientist for more than twenty years. She's written two novels, *The Promise of Pierson Orchard* (2017) and the forthcoming *Stone Creek* (late 2022). Kate writes stories about rural places and small-town dynamics with underlying environmental themes. Her characters often struggle with setting boundaries and balancing individuality with the desire to be part of a community. She currently teaches geology, creative writing and a course on Landscape, Culture and Story of Place at Moravian University.



Jennifer Gilmore is the author of three novels for adults, including The Mothers, which is currently being adapted for film with Gilmore writing the script and Executive Producing, Something Red, a New York Times Notable Book and Golden Country, also a New York Times Notable Book and a finalist for the Los Angeles Times Book Prize and the National Jewish Book Award. She is also the author of two young adult novels, We Were Never Here and most recently, If Only. Her critical and creative non-fiction work has appeared in magazines, journals and anthologies. She has been a MacDowell Colony fellow and has taught creative writing and literature at Barnard College, Cornell University, Fordham University, Harvard University, The New School, New York University, Princeton University, and Sarah Lawrence College. She is currently an Assistant Professor at Lafayette College.



Joyce Hinnefeld is the author of the short story collections <u>Tell Me Everything</u> (1998; winner of the 1997 Bread Loaf Writers' Conference Bakeless Prize in Fiction) and <u>The Beauty of Their Youth</u> (2020) and the novels In Hovering Flight (2008) and <u>Stranger Here Below</u> (2010), along with other stories and essays. She is a Professor of English at Moravian University in Bethlehem, PA, and the founder and co-director of the Moravian Writers' Conference.
