Dr. Dana Milakovic serves as the Mental Wellness and Trauma Specialist for the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE). Dr. Milakovic also supports PA in moving forward as a trauma-informed state by participating on the leadership team for HEAL PA, as well as serving as the cochair of the educational committee for HEAL PA. Dr. Milakovic is a mental health and trauma specialist with experience in school mental health, community mental health, pediatric neuro-psychology, school administration, and school psychology.

Joseph Welsh is a Founder and Executive Director of the Lehigh Valley Justice Institute. Prior to the Institute, he has spent the last 15 years as a civil rights attorney litigating police misconduct and prison condition cases. For the past six years, Mr. Welsh has served on the Board of Directors of the Pennsylvania ACLU. In 2012, he received the prestigious ACLU-PA Torchbearer Award for his work fighting voter suppression efforts.

Mr. Welsh spent decades managing political and social justice campaigns in several states. He has also served as a consultant to state and local governments.

From the Leadership Team

It's Black History Month!

How did it come about?

Born to enslaved parents, Dr. Carter Woodson, was motivated by the release of the racist film, Birth of a Nation. He believed that the contributions of black Americans were being 'left out' of history. He paid dues to the American Historical Association, but wasn't allowed to attend conferences. His mission was to right what he saw as an unacceptable wrong – the glaring omission of formalized Negro History. In 1916 he began publishing The Journal of Negro History. His hope was that understanding would create better relations in the US between blacks and whites.

Ten years later in 1926 he had another idea – there should be a week of activities devoted to Black American history. He chose a week in February because it was close to the birthdays of Frederick Douglass and Abraham Lincoln. By the 1960's the week evolved into Black History Month and was officially recognized in 1976, the year of the bicentennial, by President Gerald Ford.

As President Obama said in 2016, "It's about the lived, shared, experience of all African Americans, high and low, famous and obscure, and how those experiences have shaped and challenged and ultimately strengthened America. It's about taking an unvarnished look at the past so we can create a better future." This year's theme is Black Resistance. It's a time to remember the many ways that African Americans have resisted historic and ongoing oppression in all forms for years. As Booker T Washington stated, "Success is to be measured not so much by the position that one has reached in life as by the obstacles which he has overcome while trying to be saved."

What can we do? Visit black historic museums and sites, read books about and by black authors, support black restaurants and businesses, explore how music and dance have been influenced by black artists, watch films by and about black issues.

Empathy, understanding, and change begin with education and action, no matter how small.
