Let's Read Math™ Is Back

Eight branch members, several community partners (including one scholarship recipient), two libraries, and nine stories helped 50 local children learn that math is fun and has everyday uses. Let's Read Math™ had a positive re-introduction this summer. AAUW Easton Branch partnered with Easton and Palmer Libraries to present nine sessions of Let's Read Math lessons. The libraries included LRM in their summer programming. The Branch volunteers planned and taught the lessons.

The children learned geometry concepts from The Greedy Triangle. Each child had an opportunity to make several shapes with toothpicks and marshmallows. Wanda's Roses and Math-terpieces taught and reinforced addition and mapping. The participants really enjoyed learning to make tissue paper roses. After Grandfather Tang's Story, the children made pictures out of tangrams. The hundreds chart with mystery letters from The King's Commissioner motivated all to learn to count by 2's, 5's and 10's. How Big Is A Foot? taught the children the importance of standard measurement through the story.

The children who participated in LRM enjoyed all the stories. They were very motivated to complete the hands-on experiences. After each lesson, several children thanked us for the experience. Some of the children participated in several different sessions. All the volunteers enjoyed this opportunity to interact with the children and had very positive experiences.





Let's Read Math!





AN AAUW-EASTON BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP INVITATION

Members of the Book Group invite you to join us as we journey through readings and discussion of nine novels selected for this year. These books, each initially recommended by a single member, on first glance seem wide ranging in theme, character, plot, time, and settings. And they are. However, as we move through them, it is very likely we will enjoy finding that, by coincidence and despite significant differences, they have much in common. They will begin to "talk to one another"--to reveal any number of unexpected connections and themes for discussion.

In September we start off in a Moscow Hotel following the 1917 Revolution (A Gentleman in Moscow by Amor Towles) where we meet an adventurous nine-year-old and a hotel-October will take us to the realities of NYC and beyond during the confined Count. Pandemic (Jodi Picoult's Wish You Were Here). Two estranged siblings take on the challenges of unraveling their mother's deeply buried, secret history in Black Cake by Charmaine Wilkerson for November. Are You There God? It's Me, Margaret by Judy Blume in December will prompt discussion of targeted topics in the banned book debate. Eudora Welty's The Optimist's Daughter moves us in January to the deep South and the experiences of a WWII widow about to lose her father and childhood home as well. Stories of a record breaking, race horse and his enslaved groom beginning in 1850, a 19th century oil painting, and a Smithsonian scientist in 2019 are woven together together in Horse by Gwendolyn Brooks for February. In March, Asha Lemmie's novel Fifty Words for Rain charts the coming of age of an eight-year-old, biracial girl born into prejudice and condemnation of Post WWII Koyto, Japan. In this, our second Perveen Mistry mystery, our female, Bombay lawyer charged to settle a stalemate over the education of a future Maharaja of Satapur, quickly becomes suspicious of foul play related to the deaths of two family members in Sujata Massey's The Satapur Moonstone. In our last novel The Chrysalids by John Hyndham, we enter a post apocalyptic community, rural and religious, in which the inhabitants commit to the preservation of absolute normality--even in the face of inevitable challenges.

If you are interested in any one, some, or all these books, come—whether you've read the book or not. We meet at 2:00 pm on the 3rd Monday of each month, usually at a member's home. On September 18th, we will be meeting at Green Harvest Emporium. Debra Kindervatter will lead the discussion. Any Questions? Contact Susan.

Each girl received in-person and certificate recognition for excellence in STEAM while parents beamed. The girls received a small gift, certificates of excellence from AAUW Easton Branch as well as Representative Susan Wild's office.

AAUW PUBLIC POLICY CONVERSATIONS

An AAUW panel recognizing August 15th as Equal Pay Day for Working Moms was yet another reminder that post-pandemic, Congress must act on the "Mom Economy." When half of American families with children under age 18 have a working mom making at least 40 percent of household income, the "Mom Economy" urgently needs attention. Newly introduced Senate and House Resolutions to level the playing field for working mothers need to be a high priority for Congress in future Washington policy-making.

Senators Amy Klobuchar and Tammy Duckworth and U.S. Representative Grace Meng in July introduced the "EMPOWERING WORKING MOTHERS" Resolution. S.Res. 306 and H.Res. 605 provide a vital and necessary roadmap after COVID-19 losses. Coping with the immediate pandemic burden of childcare and remote learning was a major reality check for the entire nation. Maternal employment fell by 15.7% while paternal employment fell by 9.6% due to the pandemic. 1,800,000 men left the workforce compared to 2,500,000 women in just the first year.

The record-breaking impact on working moms was and is particularly hard when women hold close to two-thirds of federal minimum wage jobs still paying \$7.25 an hour or a few dollars above it. Additionally, mothers are more than three times as likely as fathers to be responsible for most of the housework and caregiving at home. For U.S. families if even 1 percent of mothers leave the workforce, the result is an estimated \$8.7 Billion economic loss. Not only are strong investments in childcare essential for the full employment of women, the ability to increase Gross Domestic Product is affected as the U.S. competes with China.

The 21st Century Mom Economy House and Senate Resolutions promote important innovations to address paid parental leave, maternity and paternity leave, robust funding for Head Start and Early Head Start programs, expansion of child poverty programs, address America's maternal mortality crisis and address women's health issues further by providing paid leave for workers experiencing debilitating menstrual or menopause symptoms.

The cost to U.S. industry of ignoring the Mom Economy was painfully obvious in the COVID-19 pandemic. The U.S. childcare crisis costs \$122 Billion annually, with an estimated \$78 Billion in lost earnings. \$23 Billion is lost in workforce productivity and \$21 Billion in tax revenue, according to Resolution sponsors. We ignore the Mom Economy and childcare crisis at our economic peril.
