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Come, listen, and learn how Human Trafficking has become both a local and international issue. The Reverend Richard Mollica, MTS. who has extensive knowledge about this issue, has important information to share with you. Save the Date! Third Annual Girls Recognition Night May 2, 2024

The Third Annual Girls Recognition Night (GRN) has been set for May 2, 2024. The event will take place at the Nurture Nature Center in Easton, PA.

The event recognizes 7th graders who are excelling in STEAM subjects: Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Math. They are nominated by their teachers. Last year 17 girls were recognized from area middle schools. They include Bangor Area Middle School, Easton Area Middle School, Nazareth Area Middle School, Wind Gap Middle School (includes Pen Argyl) and Wilson Area Intermediate School.

The night consists of a keynote speaker and a panel comprised of women from different STEAM areas. The girls are able to have time alone with the panelists for a more personal experience. This allows them to ask any questions they might have. Last year the girls opened up during this part of the evening.

Chapter Bylaws

Article I: Name & Purpose

AAUW PUBLIC POLICY CONVERSATIONS - OCTOBER 2023

Since 1981 October is **Domestic Violence Awareness Month**, but based on media reporting, who could really notice?

It seems little notice is taken of the severe increase in domestic violence that rose during the pandemic and never declined. Last February a Philadelphia Inquirer Editorial identified domestic violence as an "immense problem" in Pennsylvania. They noted that out of seven main Department of Human Services program offices, none is exclusively devoted to domestic violence. Pennsylvania does not follow the nationally recognized model implemented by Maryland that requires law enforcement to adopt a program specifically focused on decreasing domestic violence homicides.

Creating a single office devoted to combating domestic violence would enable government to coordinate its response to this problem and help prevent it, the Inquirer editorial stressed. Governor Shapiro could break this stalemate by creating a new Office of Domestic Violence and empowering its director to implement a more robust state-based system for collecting and sharing data. He could mandate that first responders follow Maryland's program to determine if someone's life may be a risk as a result of domestic violence.

Since the 2022 Supreme Court ruling greatly expanding gun rights, domestic abusers with Protective Orders that forced them to surrender their firearms, are suing to have them returned. The 2022 ruling in New York State Rifle & Pistol Association v. Bruen has already successfully been used in Kentucky and Texas to give guns back to violent abusers. This month the Supreme Court will hear arguments in a Texas case challenging the Second Amendment rights of abusers vs. the right to life of those they threaten.

In July Brenda Bowersox, 55, was shot in the head and chest in the driveway of her Lancaster home by her husband Steven. When she sought a Protective Order in the Court of Common Pleas, Judge Michael Flannelly denied Brenda Bowersox despite her pleading that she was afraid of her husband. Judge Flannelly denied the Order saying he was "unconvinced" and that Mrs. Bowersox failed to prove the protection was necessary, according to a Penn Live report. Denied the Protective Order, Mrs. Bowersox filed for a divorce and within two weeks was dead. Pennsylvania must do better.

Roughly twelve million people are affected each year by domestic violence. In July P.B.S. reported a significant increase in domestic violence in the year since the Dobbs decision overturned abortion rights. The Domestic Violence Hotline reports a 100% increase in calls involving control and isolation of victims by abusers, and loss of access to nearby abortion. Hotlines report more than 3,000 calls per day on average, the highest volume of calls since hotlines were established in 1996. Evidence points to Dobbs making things worse. An increase in "reproductive coercion," a form a domestic violence, is reported more often after Dobbs. The Hotlines reported more than 20,000 calls related to non-consensual sex. The National Domestic Abuse Hotline number is 800-799-7233 (SAFE).
